# **Message from Board and Executive Director**

Welcome to the 2024 Annual General Meeting (AGM) of OPTIONS NORTHWEST. We are very pleased to meet with employees, people we support, and their families, and community partners today as we celebrate an extraordinary year for OPTIONS NORTHWEST. It has been an honour for OPTIONS to support people in achieving their goals for independence to the extent possible and community inclusion over the past year. On behalf of the Board of Directors and the Leadership Team of OPTIONS NORTHWEST, we would like to present to you the Annual Report for the 2023/2024 fiscal year.

This year's Annual Report communicates the inspiring stories and insights of people we support as well as OPTIONS NORTHWEST employees from the year. The report also tells you about the work we've been doing towards achieving strategic goals in our Strategic Plan (2023-2026).

A big part of today's celebration is reserved for staff appreciation based on milestone years of service, but let us be the first to acknowledge the committed contributions our staff make every day. OPTIONS NORTHWEST continues to provide outstanding services and support to people living with a developmental disability because of the amazing work the employees, students, and volunteers do.



The following are some highlights of the past year:

#### April

- April was World Autism Month, an annual opportunity for a dedicated conversation and celebration of Autism. The Agency took the time to remember the importance of the month and the people we support that are living with Autism and Neurodiversity.
- Throughout the year, the Agency had many on-site Infection Prevention and Control (IPAC) inspections conducted by the Thunder Bay District Health Unit and did exceptionally well.
- UKG launched across the agency.

#### May

- The Agency released its 3-year Strategic Plan (2023-2026). The Strategic Plan was developed by the Board of Directors in collaboration with agency's leaders, supervisors, employees, people supported and their families, and community partners. The Strategic Plan defines OPTIONS' vision for the future and outlines the key areas the agency will be working on over the next 3 years.
- The Agency continues to meet with its community and provincial partners to support children and adults as well as learn from each other.
- Submitted a Business Case Plan for Dual Diagnosis Transition Rehabilitation Housing Project (DD TRHP).
- Lisa began work on the Alternative Level of Care Committee (ALC).
- Managed a booth at the Dare to Dream Service Provider Fair.





#### June

- We celebrated National AccessAbility Week. This special week is an opportunity to:
  - Celebrate the valuable contributions and leadership of Canadians with disabilities.
  - Highlight the work of people, organizations and communities that are removing barriers.
  - Reflect on ongoing efforts to become a better, more accessible, more inclusive Canada.
- In June the Board of Directors and staff celebrated OPTIONS' successes for 2022/23 at its Annual General Meeting.
- A Spring Booster Vaccine clinic was held with Thunder Bay District Health Unit.
- CRT ran a Speech Language Clinic at our office.



#### July

- July and August offered great weather for everyone to enjoy! OPTIONS
  employees were able to take some time off to rest and relax with family
  and friends.
- Hosted a meeting with Bob Walsh from OASIS to discuss service needs and advocacy.
- The Hub moved to the new location at The Boys and Girls Club. People supported have had a great time visiting and building relationships with others at the new location.
- The Hub hosted a barbeque at the 95 office.

- Dual Diagnosis Transition Housing Rehabilitation Project property was purchased.
- We worked with Dr. Yona Lunsky's team on ALC Project.

#### September

- The Board of Directors welcomed 3 new Directors. We are so happy to have Kerri-Lee Turcotte,
   Stephanie Milenko and Erika Bishop join the agency!
- CRT participated in the Franco Festival Thunder Bay with an information booth.
- Brandon Madore and Rosemarie MacLean from CRT attended the Journey to Belonging Conference.
- MCCSS, Minister Parsa visited the agency with Kevin Holland, MPP.
- Participated in the Day of Truth and Reconciliation in the homes and at The Hub as well as the Mazinaajim Children's Foundation Honouring Our Children Walk/Run on Saturday, September 30<sup>th</sup> at Boulevard Lake.





#### October

- The Hub held a Halloween Drop in at The Boys and Girls Club that saw record attendance and lots of happy faces!
- The Hub also hosted a Halloween Trunk or Treat event for the first time that was well received by everyone involved.
- Lisa Maki and Loni Rudnicki attended a Child Adolescence Mental Health conference. A case scenario was highlighted at the conference as an ideal model to aspire toward that we did the work on.

# Strategic Plan 2023-2026 Update

OPTIONS NORTHWEST began its strategic planning effort in September 2022 and engaged Compass to facilitate and guide the process. After several years of working under pandemic related challenges and restrictions in how people did their work in supporting and caring for others, the timing was perfect to look ahead and build a strategic plan that will guide the future work of the organization for 2023-2026 period.

We began our work with the following key things in mind:

- Using the planning effort to create a greater degree of understanding and alignment throughout the organization including the Board, leadership, staff, community partners and people we support and their families.
- Engaging thoroughly within the organization as well as with external stakeholders.
- Building in leadership and governance lessons along the way.

Given the high level of engagement and the spirit of every conversation throughout the planning process, it is safe to say OPTIONS NORTHWEST achieved all of the above.



# **Supportive Living Update**

This past year has seen a few new changes under the services programs. One of the biggest changes was the opening of the HUB at the Boys and Girls Club. The HUB started small, we made space at the 95 office in order to start a variety of different programs and skill building exercises. We wanted the HUB to be a place of education, inclusion, community, and safety for the people we support. If you haven't already, I encourage everyone to stop in or participate in any number of the programs being offered. Great place to learn, socialize and be out in the community.







With the help of our community partner St. Joseph's Care Group Cultural Services Program, we were able to train all employees in Repairing the Sacred Circle. This training aligns with repairing and recognizing Truth and Reconciliation in our community.

When one door opens, unfortunately another closes. This year we had 6 individuals we support pass away. This is always hard as the people we support become almost like family members for us because we spend so much time together in their home. One home in the agency in particular went through the process of grief 3 times this past year, Glengary. However, I can't express enough, the resiliency, the strength and the ability to lean on one another that this team has shown over the last year. The Glengary staff through all this were true leaders in supporting individuals while they were at their weakest moments. Overnights holding hands in the hospital, constant communication with family or by the bedside in the home, the staff were there during the last moments of the people we support. Truly grateful to say I work with these staff as well as the staff in our other homes, you are the best.

We continue to serve more than 70 people in our Supportive Group Living program, 11 in our Supported Independent Living program (SIL), 3 people in our Intensive Supportive Living. The area of SIL continues to grow as we welcome more individuals into this program each year.







In closing, it is truly an honor and blessing knowing that we have such supportive and caring staff that work with the people we support to live life their way. I cannot express enough gratitude for all the hard work, the dedication and the ongoing care everyone provides for people, your work does not go unnoticed. Thank you!

# **MARISA**



"The Hub" is celebrating its 3rd year anniversary! The Hub was founded as a safe space where individuals could learn new skills, participate in cooking and crafting activities, and engage in various community events. Due to its success, The Hub relocated to 270 Windsor St in the Boys and Girls Club and has experienced significant growth. The program has accommodated as many as 264 participants in a month.

The staff at OPTIONS NORTHWEST takes pride in creating a vibrant, inclusive, and nonjudgmental environment at The Hub. They have organized activities like tie-dye shirt making, tea parties, cooking sessions, gym classes, yoga, kite making, and various community events. Additionally, they have hosted guest speakers, such as the health nurse from Thunder Bay District Health Unit, to discuss the importance of maintaining physical and mental well-being.

Over the past year, The Hub has expanded its reach and now serves individuals from various agencies including CLTB, LCC, CTR, Lakehead Public Schools, and Forensics. Every month, the staff shares a calendar with a wide range of daily activities, and an array of freshly cooked meals, such as chili, beef stew, pasta, and meatballs, is always available. Everyone is welcome at The Hub.











# **Cultural Programming**

OPTIONS NORTHWEST staff and people we support have been working alongside N'DOO'OWE BINESI SJCG Indigenous Health Team, participating in weekly Cultural Programming within the 24 hour supported homes as well as weekly Friday activities at the HUB.

# **Community Resource Team**

The Community Resource Team (CRT) supported 308 people with a developmental disability in Thunder Bay and the surrounding district, comprised of 285 adults and 23 children. Many people received more than one CRT service.

Support was provided in the following areas:

- Speech Language
- Health Care
- Social Work
- Child and Adult Positive Behavioural Supports
- Single Plan of Care planning (partnership with children's sector)
- Forensic Behavioural Support (partnership with Thunder Bay Regional Health Sciences Centre)
- Occupational Therapy
- Behavioural Consultations
- Eligibility Assessments to see if people qualify for developmental services
- Access to specialized services through the North Community Network of Specialized Care including specialized accommodation funding -1 funding contract this time period
- Field work placements to 2 Northern Ontario Medical Students, 1 Developmental Service Worker student

This year we offered many groups including PEERS, Peer Connections, Siblings Group (for family members that have a sibling with a developmental disability), Snoezelen training and Plant Pals. Clinicians also do training in General Orientation for new hires and helped develop courses provincially that will be more widely shared with the developmental services sector.

In addition to daily work CRT continues to have active membership on numerous committees. Examples of this are: Development of Peer Connections, Speak Up, DSW Advisory, Special Education Advisory Committee, ONW Rights Review, Third Party reviews of Behaviour Support Plans, and the Northern Community of Practice Applied Behaviour Analysis, and Pandemic Committee. We are still waiting to hear about funding for the Dual Diagnosis Transition Rehabilitation Housing Project and have completed additional reports for MCCSS as per their request.

Innovation, resourcefulness, and talent are attributes abundant within OPTIONS NORTHWEST employees. Thanks for making a positive difference in people's lives!

# **Creativity In Supporting People**


